Most colleges will require SAT and/or ACT test scores as part of the admission process.

It is recommended that juniors take SAT and/or ACT during the spring semester of their junior year.

Since these tests are important for college admission, students need to prepare for testing.


Test Prep is offered through numerous individuals and organizations as well as online resources.



The **ACT** is divided into 5 subtests:

English, Math, Reading, Science Reasoning and optional Writing

- ACT subtest scores range from 1-36.
- Composite score is the average of English, Math, Reading, and Science.




- College application fees vary

- If you are on free/reduced lunch, ask your counselor for more information



- Not all colleges require a college essays, check college application for requirements
- o If an essay is optional, choose to write it

- It is a narrative about yourself
- Strive to analyze and show depth
- Proofread for errors and grammatical mistakes



- The college application includes an Extra-Curricular Activities Section
- Fill out & include activities from 12th to 9th grades
- Categories may include:

Honors/Awards Leadership Roles Clubs/Activities
Skills/Talents Community Service Work Experience

- *Request letters in person; provide a resume
- *For Common Application colleges or electronic submissions, select your teachers in Naviance
- *For colleges that require mailing, provide a stamped, addressed envelope
- *Be sure to write a thank you note to your teacher
- *Note: Teachers not at Plano West need stamped, addressed envelopes for mailing all materials



~ Give your recommender 3 weeks notice

Counselor Letter of Recommendation

- *Fill out and turn in the Counselor Letter of Recommendation Packet (blue packet) to your counselor
- *For colleges that require mailing, provide a stamped, addressed envelope

- Scores must be sent directly from the testing agency to the colleges
- Most colleges require SAT/ACT scores, and possibly SAT Subject Test score(s)
 If you qualify for a fee waiver for SAT testing, you automatically receive 4 college application fee waivers from College Board



- Some colleges require an interview; check your application requirements
- Contact the Admission's Office to set up the interview time
- Dress professionally, research the college, ask questions, and be yourself



- Check your college application to determine if this is required
- You may be required to provide samples of your work to demonstrate your ability
- You may be required to send a portfolio, audition on campus or submit a video




Filling out applications for college is time consuming and needs to be done carefully. PISD uses Naviance which is a web-based planning and advising system for counselors, teachers, administrators, students and parents. Through Naviance you will be able to compare colleges, track deadlines, look at selected scholarships, explore college visits, request recommendations and transcripts, and explore career options.

Getting started...

- Select the colleges tab
- Select "colleges I am applying to" tab, then "+add colleges to this list"
- For **Common Application** colleges, you must:
 - 1. Create a Common Application account & complete all required sections of the Common Application
 - 2. **Sign the FERPA wavier** & authorization on the Common Application (*Check "yes, I do waive my right to access"*)
 - 3. The <u>Common Application must be matched with Naviance</u> & the FERPA waived before documents can be submitted
 - 4. <u>Enter your Common Application email address in Naviance</u> & click "match" to link your Common Application to Naviance










Delivery/Submission types

NCAA Division I Academic Eligibility Requirements

to receive athletic aid, practice & compete the first year:

16 core courses

- 4 years of English
- 3 years of mathematics (Algebra I or higher)
- 2 years of natural/physical science (one year of lab science if offered by your high school)
- 1 year of additional English, math or science
- 2 years of social studies
- 4 years of additional core courses (from any area listed above, or from foreign language, comparative religion or philosophy)
- Earn a 2.30 grade-point average or better in your core courses
- Must complete 10 core courses before the 7th semester
 - Of the 10 core courses completed, 7 must be in English, math or science
 - These 10 core courses become "locked in" for the purpose of core-course GPA calculation

NCAA Division II Academic Eligibility Requirements

16 core courses

- 3 years of English
- 2 years of math (Algebra 1 or higher)
- 2 years of natural or physical science (one year of lab science if offered by your high school)
- 3 extra years of English, math or natural or physical science
- 2 years of social science
- 4 years of extra core courses (from any category above, or foreign language, comparative religion or philosophy)
- Earn a 2.00 grade-point average or better in core courses
- After August 1, 2018-----Earn a 2.20 grade-point average or better in core courses

If you want to play NCAA sports at an NCAA Division I or II college:

- 1. Register with the NCAA Eligibility Center at: www.ncaa.org/athletes/register
- ✓ Send the following documents to the NCAA Clearinghouse:
- 2. High school transcript with at least 6 semesters
- 3. SAT and/or ACT test scores ~ Use the NCAA Eligibility Center code 9999 to send scores directly from the testing agency to NCAA

Military Academies











The United States Military Academies include West Point, Annapolis, Air Force Academy, United States Coast Guard Academy, and Merchant Marine Academy. The application process for these schools is more complex than other colleges. It is very important to begin this process in the spring of your junior year to increase your chances for acceptance. Be sure to include your counselor in this process.

The **first step** in securing an appointment to one of the academies is to write or email and ask for a pre-candidate questionnaire. Do this during the junior year.

There are many different resources available to help you in planning your college financing. Within the counseling department there is information regarding many scholarships. Juniors are eligible to apply for a limited number. It is not too early to begin your search; however, scholarship season tends to fall during the <u>spring semester of the senior year</u>. Information regarding these scholarships is disseminated through Naviance and the counseling page on the Plano West website.

FAFSA FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID

Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or the FAFSA, is an important document to be completed for federal and state student grants, work-study, and loans. Your application needs to be submitted as early as possible, but no earlier than October 1^{st} of the student's senior year.

What is it? The federal government uses this form to determine your eligibility for financial aid, which includes: grants, work-study, scholarships and loans.

Why fill it out? The FAFSA is used to determine how much aid you will receive. It may also be prerequisite for other scholarships.

What type of aid can I expect to receive? Your prospective college will try to meet your financial need through federal, state, school and private sources, as well as loans, grants and student employment.

May I complete FAFSA on the Web? Yes, visit https://fafsa.ed.gov/ and click "Start a new FAFSA" to get started.

FAFSA Tips

- Fill out the form as early as October 1, 2017
- Do not leave any fields blank. Enter "0" if a question does not apply
- List your information accurately
- Take your time and follow the instructions. For assistance call 1-800-4-FED-AID.
- Sign the applications. If you are a dependent, have your parents sign too.
- Report ALL required sources of untaxed income (e.g., Social Security/child support)
- Fill out the FAFSA every year, even if you don't think you will qualify for aid

FSID: Online Identification

- The Federal Student Aid ID is the code that is used to identify you online
- To obtain the FSA ID, visit https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa/ Click on "Create FSA ID Now"
- You must submit your name, date of birth and social security number to receive the FSA ID
- The FSA ID allows anyone to electronically sign federal documents and access confidential information, therefore, do not give your ID to anyone

Filling Out the FAFSA

You will need the following to fill out the form:

Social Security number
Parent's 2016 income tax return (if a dependent)
Current mortgage and investment records (if any)

2016 W2 and /or tax return 2016 federal income tax return 2016 untaxed income records (if any) Driver's license (if any) Current bank statements Alien registration card

Signing the FAFSA (required on WEB or paper filing

- Use your FSA ID. Parents will also need their own FSA ID to electronically sign the FAFSA.
- Print the signature page, get the required signatures and mail the form to the address listed on the signature page
- Wait until you receive your SAR (Student Aid Report), get the required signatures and return it through the U.S. Postal Service via certified mail

Review the Student Aid Report (SAR) receive within 2 weeks of filing

- Review immediately and carefully.
- Report errors to the FAFSA Help Desk and ask how to make corrections
- Call 1-800-433-3243 if you do not receive the SAR within 2 weeks.
- An asterisk after the EFC means your SAR has been selected for verification and you may be asked for more information which will go to the prospective college

Call and set up an official visit/tour at the college

Request "permission form" from sub school prior to the visit

Parent and sub school principal must sign permission form

Have college admissions advisor sign form

Return college visit form to sub school following visit to excuse the absence

SUGGESTED QUESTIONS TO ASK ON A COLLEGE VISIT

When you visit a campus

- Take the campus tour, check facilities, including dormitories
- Visit the fitness center, bookstore, library & dining hall
- Visit a class; talk with a faculty member, if possible
- Talk to students about what they think of their classes & professors
- Eat a meal on campus
- Read the campus newspaper; scan bulletin boards, listen to the college radio station
- Walk or ride around the community surrounding the campus

Ask college students

- Do many students go home on the weekends?
- Is it possible to study in your dorm room?
- Do you like to study in the library? Do you often do research there?
- Are faculty members accessible outside of class?
- Do faculty members teach undergraduate courses?
- Is it relatively easy to get the classes you want at registration time?
- Why did you choose this college?
- Are campus jobs readily available?

As you tour the campus, ask yourself

- How does the college promote student involvement in campus groups or extracurricular activities?
- In what ways does the college help students graduate in four years?
- What is it like to live here?
- Where do students get together on campus?
- Are the rooms in the residence halls comfortable, and are kitchen and laundry facilities available?
- How accessible are computer labs and internet access?
- Are there study groups, math/writing labs?
- What's the surrounding town or city like?
- What are the best reasons to go to this college?

Admission requirements

- What minimum ACT/SAT scores are required?
- Is an essay, and/or an interview, and/or recommendations required?
- What are the application deadlines? Does the school offer early decision?



Location

- How far do you want to be from home? Do you prefer a large city or small town?
- Do you want to live on campus or commute?
- Do you want to attend a large or small campus?
- What type of transportation is available to get you to the campus? Cost?



Academics

- Does the academic program meet your needs/interests? Is career counseling available?
- What is the student-to-faculty ratio? Do graduate students teach classes?
- Do most students graduate in four years?



Campus housing and facilities

- What are the dorms like? How are roommates chosen? Is off-campus housing available?
- Are students required to live on campus? For how long?
- What facilities are offered: athletic center, computer lab, library?



School activities

- Does the school offer intercollegiate and/or intramural sports?
- What types of student organizations exist?



Student body

- Do you want to attend a public or private institution? (costs vary greatly)
- What size school interests you? Do you want to attend a co-ed school?



Cost and financial aid

- What is the cost of the college?
- Is financial aid available? What percentage of students receives financial aid?
- Are there scholarships available for which you might automatically qualify?



WHAT A SCHOOL WANTS TO KNOW ABOUT YOU

- What is your academic history and GPA?
- Did you take challenging classes in high school and have a strong senior year schedule?
- How do your ACT/SAT scores compare with other students' scores?
- What honors and awards have you received?
- What extracurricular activities/volunteer activities are you involved in?
- How does your writing compare to other applicants (the essay)?
- What do your counselor and/or teachers say about you?

Texas Success Initiative (TSI)

Test required by 2 & 4 year Texas public colleges/universities for college course placement (not criteria for admission)

TSI assessment consists of 3 parts: Reading, Writing, and Math

- Exemptions may be based on the following SAT or ACT scores:
 - ACT score of 23 composite; with a score of at least 19 English & 19 Math
 - SAT scores minimum score of 480 CR/W & 530 M



AP courses are recognized as a means for high achieving students to receive college credit while still in high school...

- AP tests are given in May each year
- Each AP test is given a score from 1 to 5
- Credit awarded varies among colleges and universities

FINAL EXAM GRADE WAIVER AND EXEMPTION GUIDELINES Final Exam Grade Waiver- 11th graders

Students enrolled in an AP course for the second semester of the school year may be eligible for a grade waiver from the final exam in that subject for the second semester if the following conditions exist:

- ✓ A minimum overall 2nd semester average of 80 (per class) and a minimum grade of 80 in the final grading period.
- ✓ Student takes the National AP exam for that course in May.
- ✓ Student shall have no more than four absences during the second semester (per class).
- ✓ Student shall have no more than five tardies in that AP class.
- ✓ No major infractions resulting in ISS, Saturday School, Out of School Suspension, or Special Program Center.
- ✓ Student must have no outstanding fines, fees, or debts for school property or other PISD services.
- ✓ Student takes the semester exam on the date/time original scheduled, in the case of an excused absence, during the determined make-up exam time.

To qualify for the grade waiver:

- Students must report to class on the day of the exam and take the final exam for the course.
- If the semester exam grade benefits the student, it will be recorded and counted toward the student's course grade.
- If a student has an unexcused absence during the exam, the student forfeits the option to take advantage of the exam grade waiver, and will take the exam for credit.



Final Exam Exemption-12th grade

Seniors may qualify for exemption from final exams during the second semester of the school year if the following conditions exist:

Seniors in AP courses

- ✓ A senior in an AP class must meet the criteria noted **above** to qualify for exemption in that AP class.
- A senior in an AP course who chooses not to take the national exam may also quality for the final exam exemption if all of the requirements for the Senior Exemption Guidelines are met.

Seniors in non-AP courses

- A minimum overall 2nd semester average of 85 (per class) and a minimum grade of 85 in the final grading period.
- Student shall have no more than four absences during the second semester (per class).
- Student shall have no more than five tardies in each class.
- No major infractions resulting in ISS, Saturday School, Out of School Suspension, or Special Program Center.
- Student must have no outstanding fines, fees, or debts for school property or other PISD services.

To qualify for the exam exemption:

- Students must be present in class for each exam. Various activities will be conducted at this time for students qualified to use exemptions, including the completion of course evaluations, student surveys, and projects.
- Exempt students may choose to take the exam. I the semester exam grade benefits the student, it will be recorded and counted toward the student's course grade.
- If a student has an unexcused absence during the exam, the student forfeits the option to take advantage of the exam exemption, and will take the exam for credit.
